CHAPLAINCY TEAMS



CAFOD GRADUATION



On Friday 14th June, Year 12 pupils from St Michael's were invited to St George's Cathedral to attend their graduation celebration, completing their CAFOD Young Leadership Program. This year's participants were an exceptional example of faith in action and dedication to the cause. Starting with St Michael's Day, where they helped to raise over £600, along with all the assemblies they have put together and shared across the college. Along with all of the students in the Year 12 Chaplaincy team, they have helped to raise awareness of causes important to the college and many of them are ambassadors for other groups, such as the All Are Welcome and Diversity teams. Well done to them on a great year.

On the 14th of June, the Graduation Ceremony for the CAFOD Young Leader Program took place, marking the culmination of a year of faith, teamwork, and community service. The event was held at St George's Cathedral, Southwark commencing with a networking session and a guided tour of the Cathedral. One of the notable centerpieces of the tour was the Romero Cross, a significant symbol of peace and justice. This cross commemorates Archbishop Oscar Romero, a prominent figure known for his advocacy for human rights and his unwavering commitment to peace during a tumultuous period in El Salvador's history. Dedicating his life to speaking out against oppression, violence, and social injustices faced by the Salvadoran people. WORLD RELIGIONS: RIDVAN AND SHAVUOT







Ridvan is a Bah'ai festival. Ridvan, also known as the Most Great Festival, celebrates Baha'u'llah's time in the garden of Ridvan on the outskirts of Baghdad in 1863 when He publicly declared His station as a Manifestation of God. The Ridvan Festival is 12 days long and is also the time of year when Baha'is elect their governing bodies.

In lessons, Year 7 and Year 8 in RE learnt all about the history of the Bah'ai faith and how this festival came to be, creating Ridvan cards to celebrate this.

After school, we held an event called the Roses of Ridvan. Roses are a popular gift to give one another for Ridvan, reflecting on the beauty of the garden. We had an interactive workshop where students could make their own paper flower bouquets, enjoyed a sweet treat and a short presentation led by Year 12 Chaplaincy members.



Though it is less observed in modern times than other Jewish holidays, Shavuot marks one of the most important moments in Jewish history, the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai. This was the moment when, in the Jewish understanding, God's will was expressly communicated to human beings. It also marked the transition of the ancient Israelites into a religious community bound by covenant into a mutual relationship with God. It is a springtime holiday.

The term Shavuot itself literally means "weeks," a reference to it falling in the calendar precisely seven weeks after the start of Passover. As a college, Year 7 and Year 8 Faith in action presented a retelling of this story, supported by Year 10 and Year 12. Year 7 helped to build the 'mountain' painting and building boards, whilst Zachary 0 in Year 8 took on the role of Moses, collecting the two tablets. This festival is a dairy based one, all who attended enjoyed cheesecakes and yoghurts.





FAITH IN ACTION GRADUATION



On Monday the 8th July, we were proud to celebrate the achievements of KS3 pupils in Faith in Action who have worked tirelessly to work in service of Christ and of others. The ceremony had been a while coming for Year 9, whom some of them received the glory of all three awards, Bronze, Silver and Gold. 




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FLORENCE: THE SALESIAN EXCHANGE
