### **Dulwich College - Philosophy Circle**

Along with other schools, we were given a tremendous opportunity to attend a Philosophy lecture at Dulwich College by Dr Spinney (Dept of Philosophy - UCL). The lecture explored the intersection of language and philosophy, delving into the power of language over our thoughts and feelings, and the ultimate effect this entanglement can have on a society. Ludwig Wittgenstein, a Austrian-British philosopher, dedicated his work primarily on the philosophy of logic of which the 'philosophy of language' is encompassed. Wittgenstein claimed that "Philosophy is a battle against the bewitchment of our intelligence by means of our language", by which he states that it is our misuse of language that can have negative implications on our philosophies. In his

work Wittgenstein claims that it is human nature to create and foster conflict. Therefore, as our language, the way we shape meaning and semantics, changes all the time, permanent resolution is difficult and so conflicts take on cyclical patterns. Wittgenstein proposes that the solution to language being a barrier to philosophy lies in understanding the limitations and functions of language itself. He suggests that philosophical problems often arise from misunderstandings about the use of language. By clarifying how language functions and recognizing the diverse ways in which it is used, Wittgenstein believes we can dissolve many philosophical confusions and problems. Thank you very much to Dr Spinney for giving up his time to deliver this lecture and immerse us in the world of philosophy and to Dulwich College for such warm hospitality!

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### SSLP Student Conference: AI and Creativity

St. Michael's recently attended the Southwark Schools Learning Partnership student conference at Kingswood House in Sydenham Hill, London, where we explored the intriguing future of artificial intelligence. The conference featured talks from guest speakers: Rob Campbell, Dr. Kitty Hung, and Tony Guillan. Campbell emphasised the crucial skills needed for a tech-driven world (such as adaptability, collaboration, and problem-solving). Dr. Hung shifted the focus to the potential uses of AI in humanitarian and social contexts, highlighting how technology can address global challenges and improve lives. Finally, Tony Guillan provided an industry perspective, discussing AI's role as a tool to enhance, rather than replace, human creativity.



A key highlight was the chance to partner with students from James Allen's Girls' School on a unique interschool project. Together, we are planning to organise a student-judged art competition that will include both human-made and Al-generated artworks. This initiative aims to explore student views on Al's role in the arts, and provoke discussion about the boundaries of creativity in a tech-influenced world. The conference gave us valuable insight into Al's growing influence and how it is shaping the future, particularly within the creative sector - and the competition will allow us to engage with these ideas in an analytical, interactive way.

The judges were very impressed with all presentations and felt that all the products were viable. The winners were 8 Bosco, as they were judged to have costed their product most carefully. All enjoyed the experience, as well as the amazing views over London and the Thames from the 19th floor.

Our winning group will now manufacture their product and put the finishing touches to marketing and sales strategy. On December 4th they will sell their product at Borough Market. They will be competing against 6 other schools in Southwark with the winning group awarded money to donate to a charity of their choice.


