THE LAUNCH OF THE JUBILEE



Just before Christmas, Mr Kelly led assemblies on the preparation for the start of the Jubilee Year, which commenced on Christmas Eve – where Pope Francis unsealed the Holy Doors, something that happens usually every 25 years. In January, Ms Corcoran, Mr Kelly and Miss Casey then officially launched the Jubilee at St Michael's with another range of assemblies.

Friday 24th January was the launch day in Southwark and all students and staff shared in a presentation all about HOPE! — and how we this year can be and will be Pilgrims of Hope. Each student completed a declaration of hope for the year, that they can add to as the year goes on; it was a way to make a pledge. Later on in the day students were then invited to take part in a challenge to give back to the rest of the world. By answering questions at lunchtime on Friday we managed to donate 43,020 grains of rice towards the UN World Food Program. Finally each form was given bunting to decorate with messages of hope to hang up in their classrooms for the year. 7 Vicuna were first and shared some lovely messages.

Each class had an introductory session with their class teachers, following this they travelled along Jamaica Road in their next lesson to hear from Canon Alan about the artistry and meaning behind these Stations. Students were then able to share their own reflection from the previous lesson with one another going around the church before returning to school.

Miss Casey told us all classes would be doing this but we were going first. The priest spoke to us for a little bit before we had the chance to go around the church to see the images for ourselves and not just on paper. 





LENT: 40 ACTS


#Appreciation- send an email, Whatsapp, or a snap chat to someone to thank them for what they do for you
